Inti College Sarawak expands into Jakarta

INTI College Sarawak has expanded abroad with the setting up of its first overseas branch campus in Jakarta, said chairman Datin Lillah Mohd Salleh.

"The Jakarta campus, opened in May, has about 100 students. It will be the first of a series of branch campuses throughout Indonesia that Inti College Sarawak has planned to open," she said.

On Saturday, Sarawak Chief Minister Tan Sri, Abdul Taib Mahmud opened Inti College Sarawak's new campus in Jalan Stampin Timur, Kuching. The purpose-built campus is located on the former St Patrick's school site.

Lillah said the college, set up 10 years ago in a shophouse at Palm Road, had invested over RM20mil in its building infrastructure and hardware facilities.

She said the entire campus was wired with e-mail access for all departments while Internet access was provided through a leased line.

"More will be invested to provide cutting-edge facilities for students," she added.

The college now has over 2,000 students, including 317 foreigners from several countries.

Lillah said the college had produced over 5,000 graduates, including 2,000 foreign students.
