

## Bridal wear, music and even a new course at Inti

STUDENTS of the World Religion Class of Inti College Subang Jaya recently held an exhibition entitled "Traditional Weddings in Malaysia".

A lot of effort and research was put into their work and they also performed mock wedding ceremonies at their booths complete with traditional wedding attire of Hindu, Muslim, Buddhist, Christian and Sikh marriages.

Meanwhile, the Music Appreciation Class organised a contemporary pop exhibition the next day and each group put up a performance on stage to a packed audience who gathered to catch a glimpse of the college's own Bob Marley, Westlife, the Beatles, Bee Gees and others.

Meanwhile, Inti College in Penang is set to offer the Inti Australian Diploma of Commerce Programme which will enable students to transfer their credits to several Australian universities.

College principal Dr Hamzah Darus said the college hoped to have its first intake for the programme in December.

"The programme will offer students the choice of transferring their credits to top-notch Australian universities, namely the University of Sydney, University of Adelaide, University of Wollongong, Queensland University of Technology and Swinburne University of Technology," he told a press conference recently.

He added that the programme would

replace the college's twinning programme, which only allowed students to complete their degree in University of Sydney.

According to University of Sydney economics and business faculty dean Professor Peter Wolnizer, students who successfully complete the first year of the Inti diploma programme with an average grade of 65% or a B average could transfer directly to the university.

The university would also award the top scorer of the diploma programme a full-tuition scholarship worth RM30,000 to complete his degree.
